## NORTH DAKOTA NEWS

Latest Happenings Gathered in  
the Filibuster State

### NEW COURTHOUSE

CORNER STONE OF DICKEY  
COUNTY'S NEW STRUCTURE  
IS LAID.

### ATTENDANCE WAS LARGE

Ceremonies Were Under the Auspices  
of the Masonic Order of County  
and Grand Master John A.  
Jull Was in Charge.

Ellendale—The corner stone of the  
new court house for Dickey county  
now in progress of construction in this  
city, was laid on Wednesday afternoon  
with an immense throng from all parts  
of the county in attendance.  
The board of county commissioners  
and the Masonic Order of the county  
were in charge of the ceremony. The  
arrangement of the program of the day and  
the reception and entertainment of  
visitors was in the hands of the ex-  
ecutive committee of the county and all  
visitors were carefully looked after. The  
entire county was represented in the  
audience that thronged here to  
witness the occasion. In addition  
to the formal address by the Masons  
a number of addresses were made by  
prominent citizens of the county and  
others.  
The Ellendale City Land furnished  
music for the occasion and vocal solo-  
ists were given by the male school  
chorus and a male quartette.  
The structure when completed will  
not only be a credit to Dickey county,  
but to the state as well.

### Expenses Reached \$60,000.

Bismarck.—On account of the fact  
that it has been so far impossible to

when rescued by her mother. She died

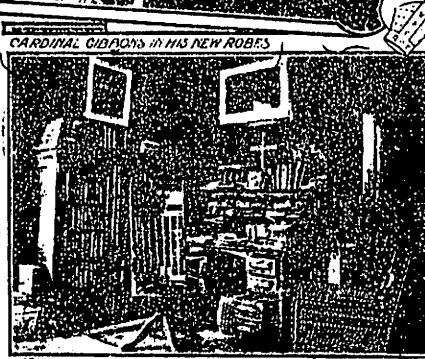

**WERE ABOUT TO ATTACK**

NEWS OF DIAD'S RESIGNATION IS  
RECEIVED IN MCK OF TIME.

Insurance Was About to Attack Ja-  
son. When News Was Received  
Folks May Retire.

St. Paul, Tex., May 3.—The residents  
of Ciudad Juarez, the Mexican city  
across the Rio Grande, awake today  
to find that they had been spared a  
real battle which might have resulted  
in one of the deadliest conflicts of  
the Mexican revolution. Creeping in  
the dark of the night the insurrecto  
army, supposed to be on its way south  
because it feared American interven-  
tion if it attacked Juarez, was about  
to do so at a better time of the fort  
and had just met when an American  
troop detachment from Mex. City,  
led by Col. J. P. Wood, had been  
sent to the city to assist in the  
city's defense.  
Today Juarez is the Mexican city  
the army, according to President  
Huerta, had a luncheon they think  
the aid how he has saved the coun-  
try.  
Arrangements for the extension of  
the railway between the entire coun-  
try are being made by the state today.  
These negotiations will be hastened  
and those engaged are already along  
the entire route, other than the section  
between the two cities, has been  
and is being made acceptable for some  
time.

The loss of the recently advanced  
block on Juarez is the known to  
the President, E. Huerta, head  
of the revolution, had announced his  
intention of marching his forces south  
and attacking the city. Juarez

upon the plan of attack with hand-  
ling their efforts against it. It was  
arranged that General Alvarado would be  
permitted to leave first and proceed  
to Juarez, eleven miles away. With  
their chief out of reach they were to  
have pursued the attack. The insur-  
rection under cover of night crept back  
toward the federal outpost and lay  
in position to open fire simultaneously  
at night.  
No light was kindled, the movements  
of the advance guards were slow and  
reticent. The news that President  
Huerta had submitted to the federal  
demands for announcing his intention to  
retreat some two hours before the time  
planned for the attack, and the in-  
surrector turned back to their camp-  
ing grounds where they are encam-  
pment, when they believe to be the  
triumph of the revolution.

**Methods to Unite.**  
St. Paul, Tex., May 3.—Having

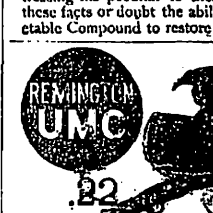
