 Latest Happenings Gathered in

SAVS \$7,000 IS MISSING.

Elevator Agent at Finley Absent and
 Whereabouts Unknown.

Finley—J. J. Newell, agent of the
 Finley Elevator company
 to this city, is missing and a search
 of the company reveal an alleged
 shortage of approximately \$7,000. No
 Newell any yet, investigation into the
 account failing to reveal whether the
 alleged shortage is caused by embe-
 zlement or by mismanagement.

Newell, when last heard of was in
 Moorhead, Minn., having left the city
 April 13. Within the past few days
 he failed to return without suspicion,
 leading to an investigation of the el-
 evator's accounts and discovery of
 the alleged shortage.

Assets of the elevator at the present
 time are approximately \$12,000, with
 liabilities scheduled at \$20,000, leaving
 a deficit of \$7,000 to be carried for-
 ward. The elevator has a bond of
 \$5,000 with the state to guarantee pay-
 ment of storage tickets, of which there
 are a large number outstanding, with
 nothing due the elevator for grain
 and only about 1,000 bushels of
 wheat in the bin. There is a personal
 bond of \$2,500, and the company is ex-
 pected to be able to weather the sit-
 uation and reorganize.

The missing agent was formerly a
 resident of Ellow Lake, Minn. His
 wife, who is here, is now preparing to
 return to the old home.

AN OLD TOWN IS REVIVED.
 New England, N. D., Dead for Many
 Years, Takes New Life.

New England—The rapid develop-
 ment of this section of North Dakota
 is attracting a great deal of attention.
 New England was first settled more
 than twenty-five years ago by a colony
 of people from the New England
 States. They were engaged in Western
 methods and failed. Several sub-
 stantial buildings were erected, but
 nearly all were torn down later. The
 town was deserted for many years
 until seven or eight years ago it was
 re-established.

It is now the terminal of the Pregel
 road branch into this state and is
 a lively place as can be found to the
 west.

There are two newspapers,
 three banks, a large number of stores
 and other enterprises.

This part of Hettinger county is be-
 ing settled rapidly and there has been
 a rush of home seekers all spring. A
 telephone exchange is being estab-
 lished and the town has long distance
 telephone connection and telegraphic
 connection with all points of the
 state.

Parsons.—This city will entertain the makers of the state June 22.
Dawson.—This city has definitely decided to reorganize its commercial club.
Hinsdale.—Complaint is made that cows near this city are killing the sheep.
Velva.—A branch of the state humane society has been organized in this town.
New Rockford.—The Commercial Club has adopted as the city's slogan "The Midway City."
Grand Forks.—The North Dakota state league of postmasters will meet in this city in August.
Ellington.—The National Bank of this city has just let the contract for a new \$18,000 structure.
Verona.—The heavy wind storms recently did considerable damage in the vicinity of this city.
Minot.—The corner stone of the new Knights of Pythias building in this city will be laid June 6.
Grand Forks.—Recent rains have made the new concrete in nearly all parts of the state the very best.
Wahpeton.—This city will have a commercial club, the members of which are assisting in the organization.
Hollister.—The citizens of this town have authorized money to hold a large farmers' institute in June.
Devils Lake.—Governor Burke has proposed to make an address during the "Christiansian" season in this city.
James over.—Bismarck county has paid out \$1,000 bounty which terminates the death of 18,000 guinea pigs.
Carrollton.—The fish water mark for the sale of real estate in this city was raised recently when two city lots sold for \$1,500.

Dismock.—The recent rain was general over the entire state and the crop prospects at the present time are all that could be desired.

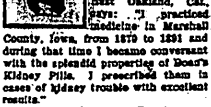
