How to Prove Up On Homesteads.

SYNOPSIS OF IMPORTANT RULINGS MADE BY FEDERAL LAND DEPARTMENT

To the Editor:
Dear Sir:—There are certain decisions and rulings of the department of the interior relating to the making of proof on homestead entries of the public lands of so great importance that they should be in the hands of every homesteader and as it is impossible to reach all the settlers by special circulars or letters, it has been deemed in this office to be of great advantage to the settlers that a synopsis of these rulings and decisions should be published in your paper, this reaching a large number of settlers who have who are settling on the public land, and to that end we respectfully ask you to publish the following:
It has heretofore been practiced in the making of five year proof to print of consecutive residence

of six months from the date of filing, or in other words the settler was allowed six months in which to establish residence on his claim, and that six months has heretofore been considered as residence in making of five-year proof. On August 18, 1911, the commissioner of the general land office issued directions to registers and receivers in the consideration of all proofs offered after December 1, 1911, to discontinue the consideration of the six months constructive residence and to require that all persons making final proof should show a residence for the whole period of five years as required by statute before the same can be approved as a basis for the issuance of patent thereon. A great many questions are asked by the office as to whether or not commutation proofs are any longer allowed to be made in lands embraced in what is known as the coal reservation. By departmental decision and ruling it has been determined that the lands embraced in that area and in which patents to surface only are issued, that no commutation proof will be allowed. This proclamation of the president, issued in pursuance of the act of congress of June 22, 1910, is dated July 7, 1910, so that in all entries made since July 7, 1910, commutation is not allowed in the coal land area, and this applies only to lands in that area.

Another matter very important to settlers on lands embraced in the coal area, which embraces all lands in this district west of Range 76, from the north line of Township 148 down to the township line between Townships 140 and 141, at which the line runs west 6 miles and runs thence south 18 miles, when it again runs west 6 miles, runs thence south 6 miles, again runs west 6 miles, then runs south 12 miles, then runs west 18 miles, thence south 6 miles, thence west 6 miles, thence south 6 miles, thence west 6 miles, and thence south 6 miles and west to the state line between the states of North Dakota and Montana, is the question of cultivation and improvement.

By an act of congress it has been provided that the lands on which entries made under the act of June 22, 1910, shall be subject to the same restrictions as to the residence and cultivation as is prescribed by the act of August 18, 1894, known as the Carey act, which requires residence for the full period of five years to entitle homesteader to patent and proof by two credible witnesses: that at least one-eighth of the area embraced in his entry, was continuously cultivated to crops other than native grasses beginning with the second year of the entry, and that at least one-fourth of the area embraced in the entry was so continuously cultivated beginning with the third year of the entry.

1,000 TONS OF HAY.

McLeod County Farmers' Raisin from Home Co.
 Sheldon.—The "rain" of tons of baled hay are being shipped this fall from McLeod and the proceeds from the sale of this hay will be used to buy a large sum of money into the hands of the farmers of that vicinity.
 The greater part of the hay is being shipped to points in South Dakota where used in securing an account of the drought last summer. Several carloads have also been shipped to St. Paul, Duluth and other eastern cities. This is several years ago when that vicinity and all of them were working overtime in an endeavor to keep up with their orders. Hay is wanted in an exceptionally high price in the east and in South Dakota and the owners wish to get it on the market, fearing the price will take a slump.
 The land in the vicinity of McLeod is almost exclusively hay country and the finest prairie hay in the state is grown there. The soil is too light to successfully raise grain, but as the land is cheap and has getting scarcer each year on account of farmers' increasing acreage broken up for the raising of grain, the owners are finding the land a profitable investment for the hay crop alone.

CITY IS LIABLE.

So Declares Dickinson Woman—Bewer Causes of Damages.
 Dickinson.—Cultivation that is liable for damages that might be done by reason of the fact that the water in the river has been made impure and poisonous for stock, is made in a claim presented by Mrs. Anna Leunzelle, the owner of a farm near the city, against the city of Dickinson. She claims that the action of the municipal corporation in dumping sewage into the river is damaging to the extent of about \$100 a month and she suggests as a remedy that such amount be paid her for the damage done to her property.

CONSIDERING YOUNG'S CASE.

Judge Pollock May Free Self-Confessed Train Robber.
 Fargo.—Judge Pollock has taken the case of Young, self-confessed Northern Pacific train robber, under advisement and may not pass sentence for several days, or until Young's case continues to attract the attention of the public. The man was arrested in Wisconsin and brought here. He first confessed participation in the crime, then declared he acted under the influence of narcotics, and still later, against the advice of his attorney, pleaded guilty. A former employee of the Northern Pacific is also showing it was almost impossible for the prisoner in having been charged with the crime.

GROWTH IS HEAVY.

Morton County Schools Gain Rapidly in Five Years.
 Minnisk.—Exceptionally large increases in the school population, enrollment districts and school buildings are shown by the annual report of the county superintendent. Just completed indicates that there are 242 school districts in the county now as against 42 schools in 1902, just five years ago. The school population at this time is 12,816 while five years ago it was only 12,124. Now 322 teachers are employed, while in 1906 there were only 121 teachers and the average salaries had increased from \$15 a month to \$20.07 a month. The increase during the coming year, it is expected, will be even greater in proportion as a large number of new settlers are coming to the county constantly.

NORTH DAKOTA PRESBYTERIANS.

State Meeting Will Be Held in Jamestown This Week.
 Jamestown.—The annual state assembly of the Presbyterians will be held here last week. The general assembly was presided by the annual state synod school institute.
 Robert R. Spoor, D. D., of New York city, was the speaker at the opening session of the institute. He is one of the secretaries of the board of foreign missionaries and this is his first visit to the state.
 Rev. Alexander Henry, secretary of the board of publications and Sabbath school work, Rev. Willis L. Geston, superintendent of the young people's department of the board, and Dr. G. Humble, one of the board's education experts, spoke.

GOOD ROADS MEET IN FARGO.

South Dakotans Will Come to Depot Meridian Highway.
 Fargo.—There is to be a big good roads meet in Fargo Oct. 25. D. H. Hurst, national highway commissioner, state engineer, Atchison, and others will be heard. One of the features will be the presence of a committee of South Dakotans and in the interest of the Meridian road from Winnipeg to the city. Great interest is being taken by Fargo automobilists in the meeting.

Pitchfork in Check.

Dickinson.—Miss Patscher, was in the city for medical attention for injuries sustained by the use of a pitchfork penetrating the cheek just below the left eye. It develops that a fight took place with the use of one of the crew picked up in a pitchfork and struck the injured man on the forehead, also penetrating the nose. Durum Wheat

The millers appear to have killed the golden egg, wheat, which has been so much prized, but only a few are left. The following from The St. Paul Dispatch is interesting.

James C. Andrews of the Pillsbury Flour Mills is quoted as saying "The small production of durum wheat is to be regretted because durum wheat is becoming an important factor in the manufacture of macaroni flour, of which consumption is increasing during the last few years or since the advent of macaroni wheat, the use of it by millers in making macaroni flour has resulted in the production of macaroni in this country that is equal, if not superior to the foreign made article. The result has been that the demand for durum wheat has exceeded the production, which is the reason for the high prices of macaroni wheat."

While he is regretting the small production of durum wheat, the consumer and the farmer will recall the right the mill owners put up to discourage its introduction. When it was found that durum wheat is particularly adapted to the conditions in the northwest and farmers began raising it the millers did their best to keep down the acreage. It is interesting to have the testimony of the millers themselves that there exists a regrettable small production of durum wheat, a condition that might have been avoided had they foreseen the possibilities of the macaroni flour in this country.

It is the aim of the society to stop the ravages and to teach the prospective victims to avoid contamination.

Mrs. Stevens is devoted to the cause of good health and the prevention of disease and she has been very active during the past five years in North Dakota. The North Dakota Anti-Tuberculosis association desires to enlist your sympathy and co-operation in their campaign of education for clean morals; clean bodies and right living. The state hospital at Bismarck, now almost completed, was secured through the efforts of this society. It will accommodate forty patients. A campaign of education and training carried on in the state with unusual vigor. Lectures will be delivered here during the week. As set out in the literature, the cure of consumption does not consist in taking some specific drug; not in employing some mysterious magic art; not in spending a fortune in search of a fountain of health, but in bringing to bear against the disease all the forces of our civilization, and in living a life in communion with nature and in conformity with her laws.
