OBITUARY.

OLE PEDERSON.

One by one our old, tried, faithful
pioneers are passing on, and the support-
ers of our congregation is being plucked
away by the grim reaper, and the
gaps in the ranks are becoming
unusually numerous. Within the
short time of two years, four-
of our oldest settlers have appeared
their last summons, the last of
these being Ole Pederson who died at
the Bismarck hospital on the
20th day of October, the others
being: Jonas Ims who died on the
8th day of December 1909, Mrs.
Ole Pederson in July, 1910, and
Mrs. Fred Holmstr. on Nov.
21st 1910.

Ole Pederson was born in Nor-
way on the 8th day of March 1839,
came to the United States and
settled in Chicago in the year of
1876 and married there shortly
afterwards. After a few years so-
journ in Chicago they moved west
and settled down in Billmore
County Minnesota, in 1884 they
left Minnesota bound for North
Dakota and settled down in Almont
where they have lived ever since.
Mr. and Mrs. Ole Pederson were
devoted Christians and have been
staunch supporters of the Church
and their loss will be felt very
keenly. As noted above, his de-
cease and having wife died a little
over a year ago, and since that
time Mr. Pederson has seemed a
different man. True he had a
daughter and three sons in this
immediate vicinity with whom he
could visit, but it seems that he
preferred being alone; his best
companions being the Bible and
other Christian books and period-
icals. It was generally believed
that the deceased was in excellent
health occasionally, even towards
the last he could be seen tending
some his cow or even trying his
hand with the little boys, there-
fore the news of his death was an
unexpected as would be a flash of
lightning from the clear sky.
About two and one or three weeks
before his death he was taken
suddenly ill, the doctor was sum-
moned and he pronounced it a
case of appendicitis. Consequently
he was taken to Bismarck, and
operation was successfully per-
formed and hopes for his recovery
were manifested, but compli-
cations set in and death came as a
blessed relief from his pain about
two weeks after the operation. Mr.
Pederson was glad to go through
this world of trials and tribulations
to reach forever where sorrow is no
more. Besides a host of friends,
the deceased leaves to mourn his
death, three sons and two daugh-
ters, Simon, David, Jonathan and
Lena; all living in this neighbor-
hood and Mrs. Rev. Theo. Gun-
derison of Velien, So. Dak. The
funeral was held Sunday forenoon
and all the children were present
also Rev. Gunderson and son Ole
of Velien. A horse from New
Salem was engaged for the occa-
sion and Rev. G. N. Isoline and
Rev. Gunderson each preached a
sermon. The funeral rites were
performed by Rev. G. N. Isoline.
We extend to the bereaved sons
and daughters our heartfelt sym-
pathy and pray that the God in
whom their father put his trust,
will also comfort and strengthen
them.
