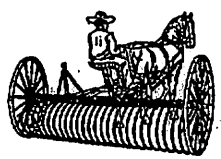

## Needed in N. D.

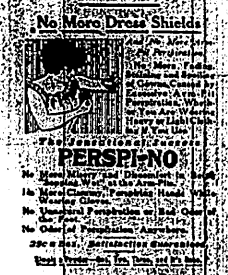
Boston, Mass., July 5.—The workmen's compensation act, passed by the recent session of the Massachusetts legislature became operative to-day. The act provides a fixed scale of compensation for industrial accidents to employes of those employers who accept the measure. If employers do not accept the law they are liable to unlimited damages at common law, and, in addition, are not allowed, as formerly, to plead in defense that the accident was the effect of neglect by the employe, or that it was the result of an act of a fellow servant, or that the employe assumed the risk of employment. Employers who accept the law are obliged to insure with a liability company.
