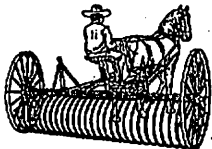

Marshal Makes Arrest at Leipzig

Louis Nohsiek Alleged to Have Sent Obscene Matter thru Mails Was Brought Here Wed.

Louis Nohsiek who is a resident of Leipzig, this county, was arrested Wednesday by deputy U. S. Marshal Lemont on a charge of sending obscene matter thru the mail. He was brought to Almont and given a hearing before U. S. Commissioner G. H. Anderson. Nohsiek plead guilty to the charge as alleged and was bound over to the federal district court. Bonds were fixed at \$300 and on the prisoner's inability to raise the amount required, he was taken in charge by the marshal for safe keeping.

Nohsiek is a foreigner and not able to understand English. During the hearing an interpreter was used to translate the questions and answers. It is unofficially stated that Nohsiek remarked during the hearing, "The woman sent me a bad letter and I sent to her a worse one." Also there are various rumors afloat as to the beginning of the trouble. Some say one thing and say another, but as a pivot on which it all seems to turn is that the woman in the case had spurned the attentions of the defendant.
