Prohibition to Stay!

That prohibition to North Dakota has come to stay is the statement of Congressman L. B. Hanna, who says in the Union Signal, a paper published in Chicago:

"North Dakota has had constitutional prohibition since statehood, and year by year the law has been better and better enforced all over the state. There is no question as to its beneficial effect, and neither is there any question, in my mind, that temperance is making a significant stride forward all over the nation."

"Many factors are contributing to the financial as well as the moral side of the question. Railroad companies, insurance companies, bankers, men in business generally, are insisting that their employees and their business shall be temperate."

"I never expect to see license in North Dakota, but I do believe that as the years go by, prohibition will become stronger and that the majority in favor will increase each and every year."

"By far the largest number of our farmers are in favor of prohibition, as the fact that liquor is kept out of the state has a good moral effect upon the men employed by our farmers. May the sentiment for temperance continue to increase in North Dakota and throughout the land."

Threshers Must Be Careful

Under the law it is necessary for threshers to use the greatest caution to avoid carrying foul weed seeds from one farm to another. The law provides that before moving from one farm to another the separator shall be cleaned - inside by being run long enough to dislodge any foul seeds that may be within - and outside by sweeping the surface. It also provides that all wagons and racks must be swept in like manner, and further, that a printed copy of the law must be posted on the machine. The penalty for a violation of the law is a fine of \$10 to \$50 or imprisonment or both.

DAYS EVENTS BOILED DOWN

Persons, Politics, Foreign and Other Intelligence Interesting to the General Reader.

Congress.

Conferees on the wool treaty bill agreed to a five-year closed season. The senate passed the \$100,000 pension bill, which now goes to the president.

The senate passed the postoffice appropriation bill containing provision for parcels post.

Attempt by the senate to pass the wool tariff revision bill over the president's veto failed.

Senate conferees with house on naval appropriation bill agreed on provision for a \$10,000,000 battleship.

Senator Polanco proposed an amendment to extend interstate commerce act to cover natural gas pipeline.

A resolution appropriating \$20,000 to furnish subsistence for refugees from Mexico was adopted in the house.

The house returned by a vote of 183 to 187 to pass over the president's veto the executive, legislative and judicial appropriation bill.

Senator Bacon introduced a bill to prevent use of American troops abroad while congress is in session without its consent.

Representative Legie of South Carolina and Henry of Iowa, whose places were contested, were declared entitled to their seats.

Senator Nevada failed in attempt to gain consideration for a joint congressional committee to confer with the president on tariff legislation.

Senator La Follette, speaking on the wool bill, attacked the wool progressive party and swore new allegiance to progressive republicans.

Legislative-executive-judicial bill, with commerce court and emergency tenure civil service provisions attached, was reintroduced in the house.

The conference report on the Panama canal bill was approved in the senate by a vote of 48 to 18 after a fight against it led by Chairman Brandegee.

The house re-passed the legislative-executive-judicial bill with provision for abolishing commerce court, but without seven-year tenure civil service provision.

Senator Penrose announced he would make a privileged statement regarding charges in connection with correspondence between him and John D. Archibald.

The bureau-traveler parcels post provision in the postoffice appropriation bill was substituted by system of representative mail and bill returned to conference.

Representative Rainey charged Representative Austin with being personally interested in the water power legislation. Representative Austin replied in a heated speech.

The house voted down 156 to 79, proposal for provision of coal battle ships in naval appropriation bill and sent bill back to conference with instructions for acceptance of senate compromise for one year.

The house accepted the senate amendment to the legislative, executive and judicial appropriation bill, retaining provision for abolition of commerce court and sent the bill to the president.

General.

A senate committee declined to institute further canal legislation at the request of the president.

By a vote of 12 to 50 the house adjourned the conference report on the naval appropriation bill.

Noir of Nebraska went light on the killing of Rogers, an American, by British troops in Africa.

Acting Democrat Chairman McAdoo seen on prospect of the presidential election going to the house with the president.

Eugene E. Smith of St. Johnsville, N. Y., was crushed to death under a large express wagon at Kansas City.

Assaulted, robbed and injured and unimproved lands in Nebraska has increased nearly 17 per cent. over last year.

The national track and field championships of the amateur athletes union of the United States will be held again in Pittsburgh this year.

Nearly the entire detachment of 100 Nicaraguan troops, comprising the garrison of the city of Leon, in the north of Nicaragua, was massacred by a force of invaders.

LONG SESSION

ALL DIFFERENCES ARE SETTLED

SESSION ONE OF THE MOST LABORIOUS ON RECORD

LA FOLLETTE'S DEMAND

Washington, Aug. 22.—"Robbed by the ephemerality of Saturday's all night session of filibusters and disagreements, congress adjourned tonight, having finished its work for the capital once more and late Monday afternoon wrote 'this' after the proceedings of the second session of the sixty-second congress.

The end was marked with a return of harmony and an end of filibusters. Senator La Follette, demanding action on the campaign fund, was the only member of the number necessary to amend the bill.

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DEADLOCK HOLDS

CONGRESS OVER

LEGISLATION UNABLE TO COME TO AGREEMENT AFTER HOURS OF WRANGLING

BILL MAY CAUSE FIGHT

Reference Measure and Amendment to Finance Resolution Expected to Delay the Adjournment

A few more weary members of congress, hating legislative procedure, are expected to stay in the city until the adjournment of the sixty-second congress.

The double filibuster which compelled the senate to wait until the adjournment of the sixty-second congress, is expected to be renewed when the house reconvenes.

Senator La Follette made known to friends that he would insist upon a record vote on the adoption of the Penrose resolution for an investigation of campaign contributions of the Standard Oil company in 1914 and of the correspondence between John D. Archibald, George W. Perkins and members of congress.

Senator Chamberlain, who led the other senate filibuster, the object of which was to force the house to agree to the payment of \$600,000 of old pension claims, has the support of many senate Democrats if he renews his insistence to hold congress until these claims are paid. The house leaders are determined to fight the claims "until December" if necessary.

Trouble Ahead.

Either of the senate filibusters hold trouble for any plan of adjournment. If Senator La Follette should insist on a record vote, it would become necessary to secure a quorum. In such an event he could hold the senate indefinitely because it would be unable to make an adjournment agreement with the house.

The general deficiency appropriation bill is agreed to on all points except the pension claim damage bill by Virginia, Maryland, Oregon and Texas and the extra months' pay for employees of the house and senate.

The Chamberlain filibuster of the Standard Oil company is a declaration that under no circumstances would the house concede the payment of any of them.

A bare quorum of senators sat in Washington up to the adjournment of the senate and a quorum voted on each proposition brought before that body during the night.

Had a dozen senators slept in their chairs through the latter part of the session, others would have been there to vote on the propositions.

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PEARL CULTURE IN JAPAN

AMONG the many wonders of the orient there is none more interesting than culture pearls.

These pearls of the sea should not be confounded with the so-called artificial pearls, for they are true pearls in every sense of the word. The pearl-bearing oyster is made to produce pearls by a scientific process in four years.

In early times people had all kinds of delicious and extravagant ideas about the way in which pearls were produced. Even so learned a man as Pliny believed that they were drops of dew, which, falling into the gaping mouth of the mollusk, were transformed by the animal's power into pearls.

From Arle's song in "Tempest":

Full fathom five thy father lies:
Of his bones are coral made;
Where are his bones? coral made:
Nothing of him that doth fade,
By the soft oceanic tide.

Sometimes two pearls will be found joined together by the connective substance, thus forming what is known as "twin pearls."

All of these kinds of pearls are called "pearl pearls," because they are found in the thickness of the animal's body and are not joined to the shell.

In the same way that twin pearls are joined together, it sometimes happens that pearls are found attached to the inner surface of the shell. This position interferes with the symmetry of the pearl so that when it is taken out of the shell it is flat on one side, making what is known as a "pearl button."

The attached pearls are not always of inferior quality but are often highly valued. The world-famous "Southern Cross," which was valued at \$10,000 by the company to which it belonged, was found at Onagawa, Western Australia, attached to the central part of the inside of a shell.

When once the nature of pearls was understood, it was not natural that many experiments were made to produce the precious objects at will. In fact, much attention has been paid to this very problem by scientific men, and they are still at work upon it.

It is well known that Japanese, the father of natural pearl culture, claimed that pearls could be produced by piercing holes in the shell of an oyster with a fine needle, making a small wound, and afterwards "feeding" the oyster for many years. But his suggestions do not seem to have been clearly understood and no one has been able to produce his method successfully. The Chinese, as it is well known, have been especially successful in raising pearls by inserting grains of clay between the shell and the thin outer membrane which covers the soft body of the freshwater mussel, and are valuable merely as curios.

At the International Fisheries exhibition, held in Berlin in 1900, some pearls were shown which had been cultivated in Germany. Upon looking at these one could see that the plain relief might be covered with numerous substances, but the result was of little value. Mr. Saville Kent, late naturalist to the government of Queensland, and to that of Western Australia, undertook the same experiment with the large pearl-oyster, and after a month on Thursday Island tried inserting a shot through a hole in the shell.

The most important of these experiments are probably those of Dr. Louis Boutan of Paris, who had been carrying on in producing pearls in the shallow water of the sea. The public was usually greatly interested, and the newspapers to Europe and America applauded his success and called it a great discovery.

It may perhaps come as a surprise to many that before Dr. Boutan's attempt, a very extensive and successful system of pearl-oyster cultivation had been carried on in Japan by Mr. Mikimoto, but his suggestions do not seem to have been clearly understood and no one has been able to produce his method successfully. 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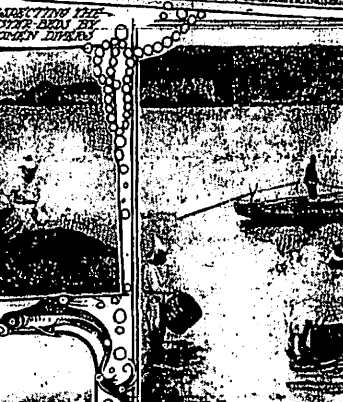
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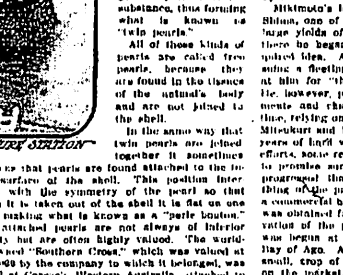

Every year during the months of July and August, small pieces of rock and stone are placed in a spot where the larvae of the pearl-oyster have been found to be most abundant. These small oyster-pieces are found attached to them. As the takes place in the shallow waters of not more than a few fathoms, they would find out in the beds prepared for them. Here they lay until their reach their third year, when they are taken out of the sea, and undergo an operation which leads to pearl formation. This consists chiefly in introducing into them the small pieces of round pieces of stone which are to serve as the nuclei of pearls. The shells are then put back into the sea and left undisturbed for at least four years more. At the end of that time they are taken out, and it is found that the animal has invested the inserted nucleus with many layers of nacre and has in fact produced a pearl.

A large part of the oyster-pieces work, such as the transplanting of the oysters, spreading them out on the beds, taking them out of the water or putting them back there is done by means of divers. It is universal in the Ago Bay and many other parts of Japan. There has been a belief from time immemorial that women can work better and longer under water than men, and in the various divers of sea are often mentioned in literature.

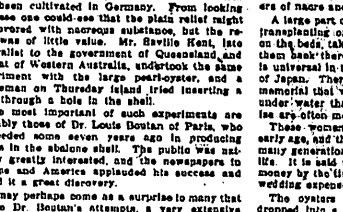
These women divers are trained from a very early age, and they seem to have inherited through many generations a special aptitude for the water. It is said that they are able to earn money by the time they are able to pay for their wedding expenses.

The oyster secured while under water are dropped into a wooden bucket of perforated sides which is connected to the diver by means of a rope attached to her waist. The average diver occupies rather less than a minute. In that time several mollusks being dropped.

A day's work consists of from four to six hours, which time 400 oysters can easily be gathered at a depth of two to five fathoms. On coming up and preparing for another plunge, the diver takes a deep and quick breath which produces a shrill whistling sound. When 50 or more are working together this peculiar noise is almost incessant.

As a considerable part of their life is spent in the sea, the prolonged exposure to water makes them suffer their skin very dark and their hair, reddish.

The water is fairly cold and it is necessary for the oyster to get up ashore to warm themselves. They are very nervous, and the work is very tiring. Their skin becomes rough and coarse, and their hair bright red.

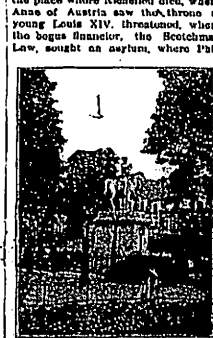

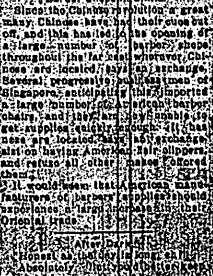

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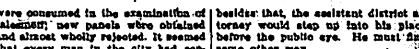
