Over One Hundred Three Bushels an Acre

Almont Farmers Getting More Grain Per Acre Than Any Other Section of the State

Progressive Flasher with Its Progressive Farmers, Outdone by Busy Almontans over Thirty Bushels Per Acre. This is Not One Field Only, but Several Have Done As Well. Wheat Crows Fifty Bushel Mark.—Barley Exceeds Three Score and Ten Mark.

That the crop around and in the immediate vicinity will give a larger average yield per acre than any other part of the state, can now be stated with an assurance that only comparative statistical reports can give. Also it can be claimed that Almont leads all other towns in Morton County for big crops and big yields per acre.

Citing two crops of oats threshed recently, the verified reports, by weight tests by disinterested parties, gave the following results:

Matt Wohlman, Almont, N. D., 104 Bushels.
John Falgren, " " 103 1/2 "

And the above fields were not considered the best while growing. John Falgren's barley gave 63 bushel to the acre; John Shirr reports 33 bushel of wheat; John Bahr reports 35 bushel of wheat per acre; and an unverified report states a yield of 46 bushel of wheat to the acre. The smallest yield thus far reported is 18 bushels of wheat.
