#### Potato Storage

Immediate Sale Better This Year

Our potato crop is larger this year. The market is unsettled and many growers are in doubt whether to market or store. In many districts there is a great deal of "rot" that is not or second growth.

Under these conditions it is unprofitable to store potatoes. The market has good storage facilities and a crop of unmarketable potatoes is a loss. It is better to get them off the market when they are in good condition and well stored in a cool place.

Double the price of potatoes in price as the winter progresses. The question is, can they be put on the market at the time when the demand is keen? For example, to store a few carloads some distance from the market and be unable to get them on the market when they are sold at a high price is a loss.

With the price of potatoes so high, it is not so much a loss to store them, but it is probably the only reliable property holding because they are to be stored in a cool place.
