Buda, Nov. 12.—The Bulgarians have captured the strategic principal point in Constantinople's last defense line, according to a report.

Philadelphia, Nov. 13.—The armored troops Tennessee and Montana weighed anchor and started for Constantinople to safeguard American interests in Turkey.

Constantia, Rumania, Nov. 13.—Unless the struggle about Constantinople is brought to a speedy termination, there will be an epidemic there as modern times never have seen, according to messages from the stricken city.

U. S. C. MEET IN WASHINGTON

SESSION IN NORTH FOR FIRST TIME IN YEARS.

Generators of Monument to Confederate Dead in Arlington Cemetery Is Laid by the Society.

Washington, Nov. 13.—For the first time since their organization 19 years ago, the United Daughters of the Confederacy are holding their annual convention north of the Mason and Dixon line. This year the daughters have come to the capital of the nation, and the convention opened today. Their main purpose in coming to Washington is the laying of the cornerstone of the monument to the Confederate dead in Arlington cemetery.

The fair visitors will be welcomed this evening by President Taft, who has invited to keep their fathers out of Washington. The local members of the U. S. C. with Mrs. Martin Butler at their head, have been laboring industriously in preparation for this event, which is being held in the city.

The cornerstone of the monument to the Confederate dead in Arlington cemetery was laid this afternoon and speeches were made by several eminent people. The monument is the outgrowth of an act of congress passed several years ago, which provided for the gathering of the Confederate dead in and about the District of Columbia and putting them in Arlington cemetery. When this was accomplished the local members of the U. S. C. and the Confederate veterans organized a committee to raise money for the monument in memory of their dead.

The sessions of the convention which will last four days, are presided over by Mrs. Alexander D. White of Paris, Tex. president general.

JURY IS COMPLETE

Jack Rees Will Be Among the First of State's Witnesses to Be Called.

New York, Nov. 13.—The last of 15 jurors needed to decide the fate of the four "gun men" indicted as the "total abstinence" of the state, but it is believed that the jury will be called today.

The trial of the four prisoners, Elmer Frank, William J. Lewis, Harry J. Lewis and George J. Lewis, is expected to be directed by their counsel, Attorney White, to challenge witnesses.
