WOMEN'S SUFFRAGE

Women's Suffrage is a matter that ought, and is entitled to receive favorable consideration by our legislative assembly, at this session; because it is a fair and just claim.

The women are deprived of this privilege, which rightly belongs to them. In the majority of states, although some states have come to the front and acknowledged women's rights, and given to them what rightfully belongs to them, the privilege of voting.

We do hope that the honorable members of both branches of our legislative assembly will pass a "Women's Suffrage Bill" at this session so it will come up at the next general election for the people to decide whether or not they want "Women's suffrage." It is an undisputed fact that it will carry with an overwhelming majority when submitted for the public's decision.

Let us urge our representatives in the assembly to pass this fair and just law and give the women what rightfully belongs to them,—an equal right with men in the affairs of government." Let us urge them to pass it at this session, as we wish to see North Dakota remain at the head of the states in progressive legislation.

"Women's Suffrage" is being adopted in several states and is coming to stay and we do not want to see North Dakota away down in the rear in the procession of states adopting woman's suffrage.

Women's Suffrage.

Women's suffrage is another step forward in the progress of civilization. When the zenith of civilization is reached, women's suffrage will be universal.

Then, why in the name of common sense, don't we grant them a privilege as great as we do the negro and illiterate foreign born men?

So in justice and fairness to the women of North Dakota, we ask you, Honorable Gentlemen of the Thirteenth Legislative assembly of North Dakota, to pass the "Women's Suffrage Bill." To vote, the women are entitled as much as men. Yours for "Vote for Women,"

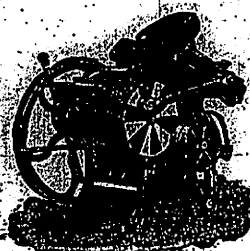
