

CONCRETE HOUSE FOR MILK

Material May Be Used in Construction of Building From Floor to Roof—Here Done, Double.

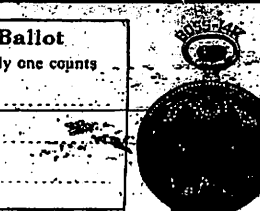
A house for keeping milk cool in the summer and storing fruit and vegetables in the winter may be constructed out of concrete from floor to roof. Make an excavation in the ground four feet deep, the desired length and breadth of the building, says the Iowa News. Set two posts in the ground at each corner leaving a space between them the thickness of the walls. Inch boards a foot wide should be placed on the inside of the posts next to the ground. The first layer of concrete, made of cement and coarse gravel, can now be placed between them. After this is done, put another layer above these and put in another layer of concrete. Then put on another layer of boards and cement and so on until the building is up to the desired height. The door frame can be set between the boards at one end of the building when the walls are built up to the level of top of ground. It may be made secure by bolts extending from the door facing into the concrete at the side. The roof can be made in oval shape by circular rafters on the sides. After rafters are covered solidly with boards a covering of asphalt may be put over these, a plate by

WESTERN CANADA MAKING REMARKABLE PROGRESS.

Settlers from the United Kingdom and other countries of Europe landed at Winnipeg last week over one thousand a day. The predicted boom in the populating of the prairie provinces this spring has materialized as it did last year. The busiest city in America is probably the Manitoba metropolis.

The sturdy nations of Europe are all contributing to the rapid growth of Canada West. Two of the largest contingents reaching Winnipeg last week were from Germany and Scandinavia.

The British Isles are sending out larger contingents than ever before. The old land newspapers are filled with accounts of send-offs and farewells being given to popular town-folk on the eve of departure for Canada.

Numerous editorials record the sentiment, bordering on despair, of the Britons who see their towns and villages desolated by the departure of their favorite sons and daughters. We can sympathize with those left behind while felicitating the young people who have their own way to make in the world, on the eve of their departure in the country of mammoth crops.

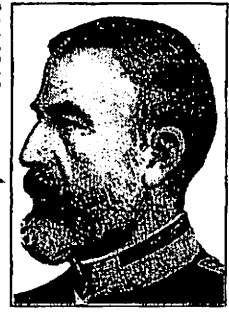
GARRISON WITHOUT MILITARY EXPERIENCE



"Secretary Garrison of the war department has had no experience in military affairs, but that is no reason why he may not turn out to be one of the best secretaries we have," said a man who was at the time closely associated with the war department.
"When I was a young man I thought the secretary of war should know all about military organization, and all about the munitions of war, but, of course, I know now that executive capacity is what is chiefly needed. If the secretary is a man of insight he soon selects the right sort of advisers."
"Secretary Garrison has been in office nearly two months and he probably knows now enough about details to render him efficient. The late Dan Lamont made an admirable secretary of war and his training had been in the newspaper office. He was managing editor of the Albany Argus when he became secretary to Mr. Cleveland, as governor of New York. Elihu Root made a great secretary of war and he probably had taken less interest in military life than the others, but he carried them out in the reorganization of the army."

KING OF ROUMANIA LONG IN OFFICE

King Charles of Roumania has granted an interesting interview to a representative of the Echo de Paris, having now reigned forty-seven years. He exercises a personal influence such as no minister can hope to attain. And he was elected by a plebiscite and has not come to the throne by more hazy, his influence is all the greater. His paternal aunt was of Mural and his maternal aunt was a Beaubarnis, thus showing his French connection. And yet King Charles is the head of the house of Hohenzollern, and the Emperor William belongs to the junior branch. He is now seventy-five, but still very vigorous. He married Elisabeth, Princess of Wiend, forty-four years ago. Elisabeth is the queen who is known in the literary world as Carmen Sylva.
Queen Elisabeth holds that the lot of kings is a hard one, because their lives are often so full of interest from their burden only by death. To the representative of the Echo de Paris the king said: "Politics have been the ruin of the Turkish army. People speak of peace, but there are many questions yet to be settled. For instance, there is a war indemnity which interests those countries that are creditors of Turkey. I am in favor of three years' military service. There is going on at this moment in France a very interesting evolution. The law of three years' military service is necessary to build up the army. If hard work soldiers can be formed in two years, but it is too short a period in which to make the best of the material at the country's disposal."

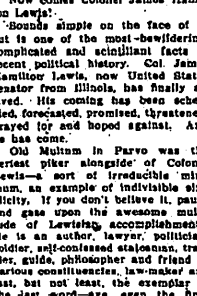


NEW HEAD OF CORPORATIONS BUREAU



Joseph E. Davies of Madison, Wis., secretary of the Democratic national committee, has declined to be governor general of the Philippines, and has been selected for commissioner of corporations to succeed Luther Conant, Jr.
Mr. Davies was disinclined to take any federal post, but at the solicitation of some of his political advisers, took under consideration the offer to be commissioner of corporations, and called at the executive residence early the other day to signify his acceptance.
Mr. Davies qualifies as an original Wilson man. He was the Wisconsin member of the Democratic national committee, and succeeded in capturing a majority of the Wisconsin delegates to the national convention for Wilson. In fact long before the Baltimore deadlock ended the delegation was voting as a unit.
When the national committee was reorganized to be in harmony with the presidential desires of the party, Mr. Davies was elected secretary. Later, after the western headquarters had been opened in Chicago, he was placed in charge and directed the campaign for all the territory between Indiana and the Pacific coast.

COL. "J. HAM." LEWIS, THE VERSATILE



Now comes Colonel James Hamilton Lewis, a simple on the face of it, but is one of the most bewildering, complicated and scientific faces of recent political history. Col. James Hamilton Lewis is United States senator from Illinois, has finally arrived. His coming has been scheduled, forecasted, promised, threatened, prayed for and hoped against. And he has come.
Old Multum in Parvo was the earliest plier alongside of Colonel Lewis—a sort of irresistible miniature. If you don't believe it, pause and gaze upon the awesome multitude of Lewis's accomplishments. He is an author, lawyer, politician, soldier, self-coasted statesman, traveler, guide, philosopher and friend of various constitutions, law-maker and just, but not least the exemplar of the last word—aye, even the last shriek—in sartorial adornment. He made France's lace his model in taking all knowledge as his province. He improved upon Lord Brougham's in relating to the world that he had been an alleged pink whiskers that would make the average prairie fire fly, be diminished head.
Colonel Lewis first saw the light of day in 1844, in the state of Virginia. Later he moved to Maryland, then to Illinois, where he was elected to the Fifty-third congress, Illinois, in 1894.
When the time came for Colonel Lewis to see him the long term senator from Illinois, and after a memorable deadlock got it.

TWO FINE VEGETABLES

MUCH MAY BE DONE WITH SWEET POTATOES AND SQUASH.

First Named, Baked in Butter and Sugar, Are Really Excellent—Recipe for Squash Served in Creole Style.

"Sweet Potatoes Baked in Sugar and Butter.—Steam four medium-sized sweet potatoes until tender; or sliced potatoes until soft in boiling water for ten minutes. Drain from the water and place a layer in the bottom of a baking dish. Sprinkle with sugar and spread with butter. Add another layer of potatoes, more sugar and butter. Fill the dish up in this manner with sugar and butter on top. Then pour over the potatoes with the water in which they were boiled and cook not over for three-quarters of an hour.
Sweet Potato Fudding.—Boil or bake six smooth potatoes, peel and press through a fine sieve; add the yolks of four eggs, cast with one and a half cups of granulated sugar, beaten with one and a half cups of butter and one pint of milk. Beat all very light, then add the whites of four eggs, beaten to a stiff foam. Mix thoroughly and add grated nutmeg, allspice and cinnamon to taste. Blend with the potatoes. Last beat all a glass of good old brandy. If you use milk, bake for an hour with a buttered paper over the top for the first three-quarters of an hour, then remove and let the pudding brown. Sprinkle with powdered sugar and serve hot or cold. Half the above quantity will make a good-sized pudding; or use only four eggs, making up the quantity of liquid in milk or cream. Cream butter may be used though it requires plenty of butter or cream.
Squash, Creole Style.—Cut the squash up in quarters; pare and remove the seeds. Cut into inch squares. Wash in cold water and put into a saucepan and half cover with boiling water. G simmer gently about half an hour and when tender drain and press out all the water gently. The water has a fine taste and returns to saucepan and add salt and pepper to taste; two tablespoonfuls of butter and stir until thoroughly heated; then let stand for a few minutes stirring gently to prevent burning. Serve hot in a covered dish with roast beef or chicken.
Squash, Plain Baked.—Wash, wipe dry of water, cut into thin slices; lay in a baking pan, skin side next the pan; spread with butter, sprinkle with salt and pepper and bake in moderate hot oven for at least an hour. When done, pour the squash with silver fork; pour a little melted butter or hot cream over it and serve very hot.
Squash, Maryland Style.—Cut up in large pieces, pare and wipe rid. Cook slowly in boiling water for twenty minutes, then drain. Arrange in baking pan, sprinkling each layer with sugar and spreading with butter. When done, add half a cup of water, cover closely, and bake slowly for an hour or longer. The squash must be soft and transparent when done. A casserole is the most convenient dish for this method of cooking squash.
Spanish Cream.
One-fourth cup gelatin, one-fourth cup of cold water, one cup of boiling water, yolks of three eggs, three tablespoonfuls of sugar, one-half teaspoon salt, one pint of milk, whites of three eggs, one teaspoon of vanilla. Beat the gelatin till soft, then dissolve it in boiling water. Make a custard with the yolks of the eggs, beaten and mixed with the sugar and salt. Beat the whites of the egg in the double boiler till it thickens, then add the strained gelatin water, vanilla and the whites of the egg, beaten till stiff and well and turn into molds wet with cold water, and when hard and ready to serve turn out on a dish. This is also called *gratiné pudding*.

Good and Inexpensive Paint.
A good paint for rusting may be made as follows: Five ounces of camphor and five ounces of oil of turpentine, the top of oil and paint the tool with a rag, or smear it on with a brush. Will keep iron or steel bright for an indefinite time.
For Mackintoshes.
Mackintosh coats which have become hard and rigid may be easily cleaned with lime water and then look as good as new. A handful of the best gray lime dissolved in half a bucket of water, applied with a small sponge, makes it better. Repeat after three hours.
French Blouses.
Beat the yolks of four eggs with one pint of sugar, and one-half pound of flour and the stiff whipped whites of the eggs. Flavor with almond or any favoring liked, drop in spoonfuls on a buttered tin, sprinkling sugar over the tops, and bake.
For Stainers.
Use a small wire of hanging up brushes, brooms, dustpans, cushions, forbs, and you will find it very much better than coarse wire. It is cleaner looking, whiter and lasts longer.
Woolens Shrink.
Hang woollens out on the line dripping wet, without wringing them at all, and let them in this way they will not shrink.

STRINGENT MARRIAGE LAW.

Minnesota May Be Greets Green For N. D. Couples.

Wahpeton.—The stringent new marriage law of North Dakota will go into effect July 1, and the indications are that after that date Minnesota will become a divorce haven for many a North Dakota pair seeking the easier road to happiness.

The new law provides that after July 1 no woman under the age of 15, and no man of any age who is a common drunkard, habitual criminal, epileptic, embezzler, feeble-minded person, idiot or insane person, or who has theretofore been afflicted with hereditary insanity, or who has tuberculosis in its advanced stages, or any contagious disease can marry or intermarry in this state.

Before a marriage license can be issued the county clerk must require each applicant to file in his office an affidavit of at least one duly licensed physician other than the person seeking the license, showing that he or she is qualified under the new law to enter the marriage state. No license shall be issued to any intemperate person at the time the application is made.

HELD AS AN EMBEZZLER.

Bernard Ashley of Bolsasvahn, Man, Arrested After Wide Search in Many Sections.

Devils Lake.—After a chase from New York to Seattle, which was participated in by detectives of several states, Bernard Ashley, age 32, was placed under arrest here by Detective C. K. 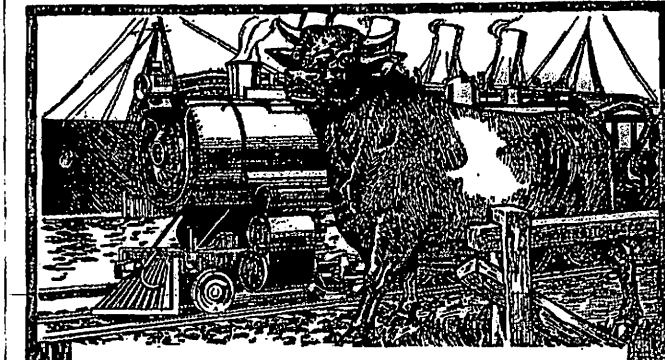

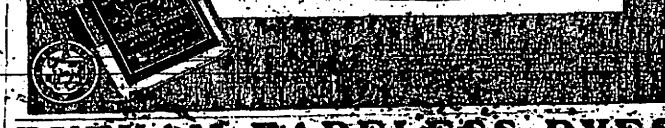
