## CARRY WIRELESS IN POCKET

French Celebrations of Remarkable Utility Bring Absolutely Correct Time in Reach of All.

When the time signal is flashed from the Eiffel tower, in Paris, the city time, wherever he may live in France, can take out his wireless receiver and see his watch by absolutely correct time. The value of the French "radio-phon" detector for receiving wireless signals lies in its very small size and compact make-up. The whole affair can be carried in the "pocket." At 30 miles from Paris all that is needed is an open umbrella held as high as the arm can reach, while a small metal contact plate attached to a cord lies upon the ground and makes the earth connection for 50 miles. The plant is kept in a tin, preferably a pine tree, or a tin with a spring as well. One of the cords with its metal clip is joined to the "antenna," while the other clip is placed on the ground.

The entire receiver weighs but 15 ounces and yet, despite of its small size, it is carefully made and is an apparatus of great precision. For long distances the "antenna" consists of France, for instance, and even further, one clip is joined to a telephone line, which serves as an antenna, and the other goes to sea or water pipes for the ground. But within 10 miles all that is needed for the antenna is a kitchen stove or range, balcony, metal bed and the like.

The operator may use his body for the ground by attaching the metal clip to his finger, while the other clip goes to the telephone wire. In this way signals were received from Paris at a distance of 370 miles.

## WHEN THE EYES NEED AID

Nature's Methods of Warning Are Many and They Should Not Be Long Disregarded.

Symptoms of eye strain are pain in the temples, pain in the back of the head and neck, red spots and inability to see at a great distance or to read long at a time. The eyes become watery and irritated; there is strabismus or cast in the eye and a tendency to avoid light. The eyes are partly closed; there are twitchings of the lids, sick headaches and dizziness. It helps on neuritis and headache that medicines fail to cure.

Nearly every condition spelled above, if brought about by defective vision or an abnormal state of the ocular muscles, can be relieved by glasses, says a writer in the "Family Doctor." The fitting of glasses is, at times, a very difficult task, and should be entrusted only to one who thoroughly understands the different defects and diseases of the eye, and is skilled in the application of them. "Genuine pine pillars" is the legend which appears in more than one drug store window—over a pile of spruce tips. The sign makes a country boy pause, for he is quite aware that the great majority of city people do not know the difference between a pine tree and a spruce or fir or hemlock tree; all coniferous trees are "pines" to them—even tamaracs.

In the matter of perfume there is not much choice between a pine and a spruce, or a fir or hemlock. It is more pleasantly aromatic than one either of pine or spruce. Pine tips or leaves are seldom used for pillows. The hemlock makes a good pillow, but it is better to use the boughs of it, quite green, for a whole bed; break them small, spread them out good and thick and put your blanket right on top of them. To make use of this kind of a bed, however, you must be in the woods.
