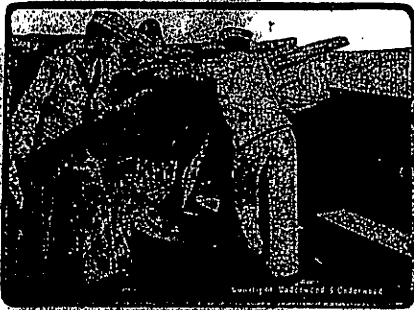

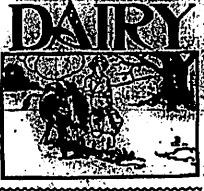

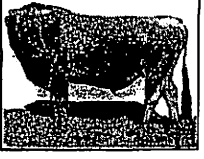

REAL WORTH IN HOT MILK

Not Only as Food, But for Many Other Reasons It is of Considerable Value. Not every one appreciates the value of hot milk.
