CENTENARY OF THE CIGAR

Soothing Effects of the Weed Were First Enjoyed in France Just One Hundred Years Ago.

It is just 100 years ago since the cigar was brought into France and smoked by Spanish officers who had attached themselves to the court of Joseph Bonaparte. One of them was fated to lose nearly half his face and an eye in the defense of Paris against the allied arms—namely, the Comte de Montle, father of the Empress Eugenie. The winter had been severe, the suffering great from want of sugar, coffee and other small luxuries in which Parisians had been accustomed. Women piled the refuse on men's faces to the barbers' shops. They unloaded barrels in the Palais and drove wagons to the markets. The soothing effects of the Coast Montle's and his friends' cigars were observed in high places, and the government instructed the tobacco state monopoly to manufacture them at libitum after a model purchased in Spain. The police saw to the distribution of the new comforter, and cigar smoking became a feature of Paris life before the disaster of Leipzig. The idea—do come again at the British embassy with cigar smoke. There was then no prejudice against the cigar. There was against the pipe, which the fine gentlemen—all small-talkers—left to the common people.

AID IN KEEPING MILK COOL

Planned Cloth Wrepped Around Can Is of Value Where Ice Water Cannot Be Had.

Where ice water cannot be obtained, or where a can of milk has to be left in a place where water and ice cannot be conveniently used, a new cloth—previously stained—wrepped around the can is an aid in keeping milk cool. One end of the cloth is fastened to the bottom of the can and immersed in a pan of water. A large amount of the can's heat radiates on the wet cloth is conducted in evaporating moisture and is thus prevented from reaching the milk. As long as the cloth is kept wet it is a protection, but as soon as it becomes dry heat passes through it to the milk and interrupts.

OATS IMPROVE MILK FLAVOR. Interesting Experiments Conducted at Government Farm Near Grand Forks, N. D.

It has been asserted by some dairy men that the feeding of crushed oats to cows will improve the flavor of milk. To ascertain the correctness of this theory a series of experiments were made by the Bureau of Animal Industry of the United States Department of Agriculture.

GOOD POINT IS OVERLOOKED. Cow Giving Milk Ten or Eleven Months in Year Pays Best for the Feed She Consumes.

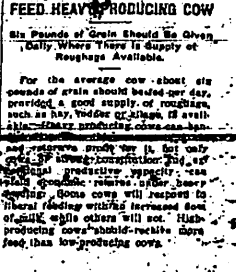
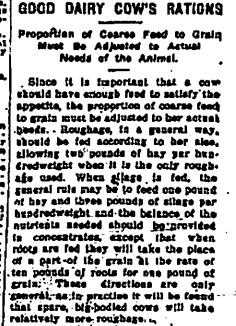
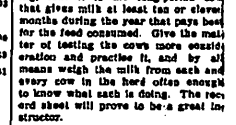
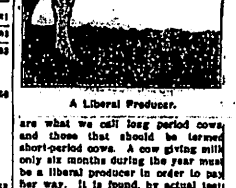
A point that is often overlooked, and should receive greater consideration, is the discarding of cows that are what we call short-period cows and those that should be termed short-period cows.

are what we call long-period cows and those that should be termed long-period cows. It is the long-period cow that gives milk at least ten or eleven months during the year that pays best for the feed consumed.

GOOD DAIRY COW'S RATIOS. Proportion of Coarse Feed to Grain Should be Adjusted to Accommodate Needs of the Animal.

Since it is important that a cow should have enough feed to satisfy the appetite, the proportion of coarse feed to grain must be adjusted to best actual needs. Roughage, in a general way, should be fed in proportion to the allowing two pounds of hay per hundredweight when it is the only roughage used.

FEED HEAVY PRODUCING COW. Six Pounds of Grain Should Be Given Daily Where There Is Supply of Roughage. For the average cow about six pounds of grain should be given per day.
