5. When you feel an urge to sideline coaching. Don't break the rules that apply to spectators.

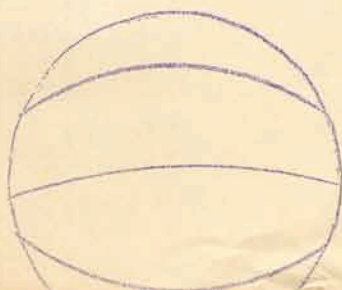
REMEMBER:

Later, she attended summer sessions at Garrett Biblical Institute, Evanston, Illinois; Oklahoma University, Norman, Oklahoma; and Dickinson State Teachers' College, Dickinson, North Dakota.

In 1930 she married Don Klingensmith, a pastor of the Methodist Church. They served in North Dakota pastorates for six years, as missionaries to the Indians in Oklahoma for seven years, and in the pastorate in Wisconsin for seven years. They have two children, Joseph and Eunice.

Mrs. Klingensmith's hobby is canning and her favorite foods are olives and chocolate candy.

At our fair high school, she teaches United States History, All the English Classes, Business Relations, and Music.

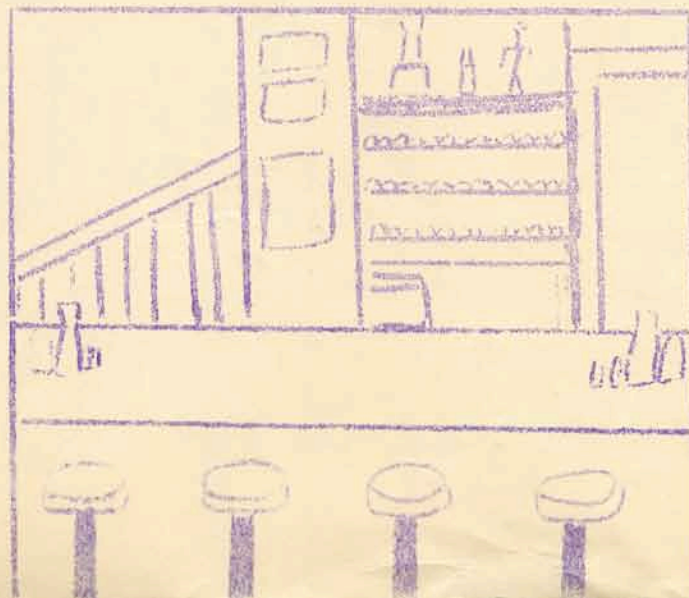
