HEART-BREAKER FOR ALMONT 33-32

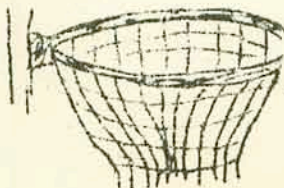
