Over three thousand public school teachers, many school officers and representatives of the P. T. A. organizations from all parts of North Dakota met in Bismarck, October 17, 18, and 19 for the Annual State Convention of the North Dakota Education Association. All the Almont Teachers attended the Convention and found it a time of fellowship, instruction and inspiration.

The evening sessions of the Convention were general assemblies for all delegates and were held in the World War Memorial Building. Outstanding leaders from other states were guest speakers at these meetings, and included: A. V. Pigott, Business man and former Asst. Supt. of schools, Winnipeg, Canada, Forrest Rozell, Field Director, Arkansas Education Association, Little Rock, Arkansas, Roy Meuther's substitute from the U. A. W. C. I. O., Detroit, Michigan.

Excellent musical numbers were brought at the evening sessions by the Bismarck High School Band, Dickenson State Teachers College Chorus, the Bismarck High School Choir and the All-State High School Orchestra. The latter brought a half-hour concert as part of the last evening session. The members of the Orchestra were outstanding members of various High School bands and orchestras in the state and had been rehearsed for two days under the direction of Miss Elizabeth Green, Clinician Conductor from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor.

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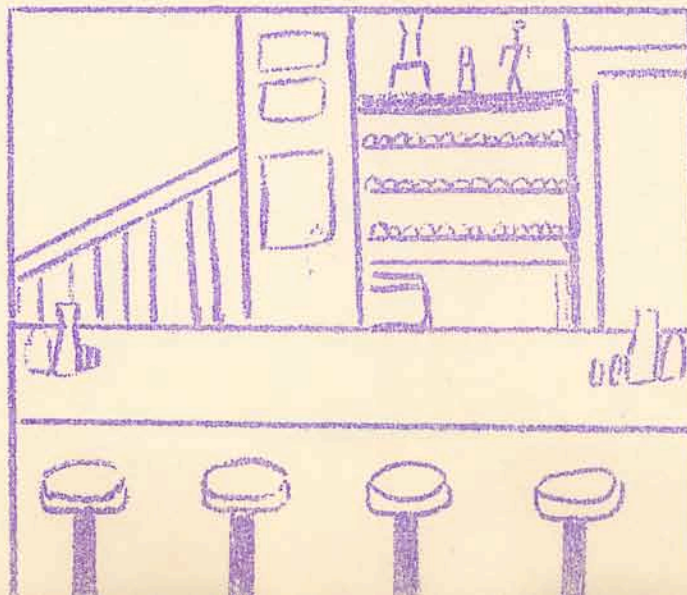
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
